## WHAT IS A MAN?

<b>Roger Ebert:</b> What other figure in the history of the cinema has been an actor for 53 years, a director for 37, won two Oscars for direction, two more for best picture, plus the Thalberg Award, and at 78 can direct himself in his own film and look meaner than hell? None, that's how many.
Whatever your take on Walt Kowalski, <b>Gran Torino</b> opens with Clint in familiar territory – he is and he likes it that way.
There are many themes that run through this movie: racism and how it will be overcome; how to live with guilt and regret and if it is possible to find forgiveness; what a family is and why they so often end up estranged and disconnected.

What redeems Walt's character is that, almost in spite of himself, he loves. He comes to love Thao and Sue and ultimately to care more about their lives than he does his own.

Women can't do that. Passive weak men can't do that. Only real men can communicate to a boy: you're one of us; you're accepted; you are a man.
What makes Thao into a man?  It's – given by Walt Kowalski through acts of serving and ultimately sacrifice.
Walt Kowalski teaches us that is more powerful than vengeance; that strength often appears as weakness; and ultimately what provides security and life for others is not a bullet coming from the barrel of a gun but love coming from the heart of a man.
These are the very lessons taught to us by the truest, strongest man who ever lived when he stretched out his arms and willingly gave himself to death that we might live, shortly after he spoke these words:
<b>John 15.13:</b> Greater love has no man than this – that he lay down his life for his friends.
